Biographies of the Instructors

Heidi Beha is a German political scientist and economist by training. For two years, she worked for the news service of radio SWR. Driven by passion and curiosity, she signed up in 2010 as a project manager of the Robert Bosch Stiftung in Russia and Ukraine, where she was involved in women's football and media projects during the 2012 UEFA European Championship. A year ago she joined the Deutsche Gesellschaft für Internationale Zusammenarbeit (GIZ) as a social media manager (@heidibh) and communications specialist in Frankfurt. Heidi Beha is an organizer of women's football projects across Europe and is a player herself. As a member of FutureLab Europe, a European youth network and think tank, she participates in panel discussions and youth forums, publishes articles and joins high level policy conferences.

Olga Chepurnaya is Professor of Urban and Sports Studies at the Department of Liberal Arts and Sciences at St. Petersburg State University. In her current research, she applies critical theories of sports to Soviet and Russian sports policy. In particular, she is researching the 1980 Summer Olympics in Moscow as a mega-event in the context of the Cold War and the case of the construction of a new football stadium, Gazprom Arena, in St. Petersburg, Russia.

Andrey Makarychev is Guest Professor of Government and Politics at the University of Tartu. His areas of expertise are security concepts and Russia's foreign and defence policies in its neighbourhood. His record of previous institutional affiliations includes George Mason University, the Centre for Security Studies at ETH Zürich, the Danish Institute for International Studies, and the Linguistics University of Nizhny Novgorod. He is a co-editor of the book *Changing Political and Economic Regimes in Russia* (Routledge 2013) and the author of numerous articles published by *Global Governance, International Spectator, Problems of Post-Communism, Demokratizatsiya, Journal of International Relations and Development, Cooperation and Conflict, Europe-Asia Studies, Journal of Eurasian Studies, Welttrends, and other international peer-reviewed journals, as well as book chapters in edited volumes published by Ashgate, Palgrave Macmillan, Nomos, etc.*

Sergei Medvedev is Professor and Associate Dean at the Department of Political Science at the Higher School of Economics, Moscow. Born in Moscow, he studied at universities in Moscow, Prague, and New York City, and holds a Ph.D. in history. In the past 20 years, he has held research positions and professorships in Russia, Germany, Italy and Finland. He specializes in political theory, sociology, Russian studies, history, and social anthropology. Sergei Medvedev leads an international educational project Escapes from Modernity, organizing summer and winter schools across Europe dealing with issues of political sociology. He also hosts weekly TV and radio talk shows on history and civilization and writes columns for the Russian press. Among his recent books are *Constructing Identities in Europe: German and Russian Perspectives* (Nomos 2012), *EU-Russia Relations: Alternative Futures* (FIIA 2006) and *Mapping European Security After Kosovo* (Manchester University Press 2002).

Viacheslav Morozov is Professor of EU-Russia Studies at the University of Tartu. He has published extensively on Russian national identity and foreign policy, and, more recently, also on Russian domestic politics and discourses on democracy. His current research project focuses on exploring the subaltern nature of Russia's imperial pursuits, and thus applies postcolonial theory to Russian politics. He is the author of *Russia and Others: Identity and Boundaries of a Political Community* (NLO Books 2009) and the editor of *Decentring the West: The Idea of Democracy and the Struggle for Hegemony* (Ashgate 2013).

Katri Pynnöniemi is Researcher at the Finnish Institute of International Affairs (FIIA) affiliated with the EU's Eastern Neighbourhood and Russia research programme. Her current research explores problematization of critical infrastructures in the context of Russian security policy thinking. Her recent publications deal with Russia's defence industry, the Arctic strategy, and the politics of transport infrastructure development. She is the author of *Critical Infrastructure Protection and Russia's Hybrid Regime* (European Security 2013), *Russian Critical Infrastructures: Vulnerabilities and Policies* (FIIA 2012) and *International Transport Corridors at the Conjunction of Geography and Politics in Russia* (Tampere University Press 2008).

Igor Tomashov is Lecturer at the Department of Political Science at the Higher School of Economics, Moscow. He holds a B.A. in Political Science and a M.A. in International Relations from the Higher School of Economics and teaches a course on the history of political thought. He has also participated in various educational programs in Great Britain, Finland, and Germany and interned for the Carnegie Moscow Center and the Stanford US-Russia Forum. Since 2008, Igor Tomashov works as a project coordinator for the Escapes from Modernity. He is particularly interested in constructivist approaches to political science and has a number of publications in both Russian and English.
